C. Hubert H. Parry

Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry shaped twentieth-century English music as a composer, scholar, teacher, and administrator. Parry's 1902 coronation anthem, "I Was Glad", stands among the best-known anthems of the Anglican tradition and embodies Parry's philosophy that craftsmanship and expressivity should be balanced. Parry influenced generations of musicians as Professor of Music History and director of the Royal College of Music.

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REFLECTION - AN HISTORIC EVENT

Dr. James Albers

The Association of Lutheran Church Musicians commissioned Herman G. Stuempfle to write a text and Carolyn Jennings to write a hymn tune for ALCM's tenth anniversary in 1996. It was first sung in ALCM anniversary hymn festivals in the United States and Canada. Stuempfle served as professor of preaching, dean, and president of Gettysburg Seminary. He wrote over 500 hymns. Jennings taught at St. Olaf College from 1960 to 2002 and also served as choir director at St. John's Lutheran Church, Northfield for many years. The Valparaiso University Department of Music, through the Hoermann-Koch Sacred Music Endowment, commissioned Zac Flasch '23 to compose this setting for choir, band, orchestra, organ and assembly in celebration of the university's Lutheran centennial.

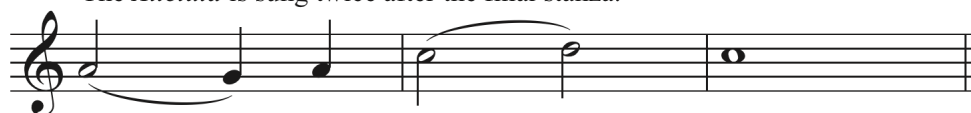

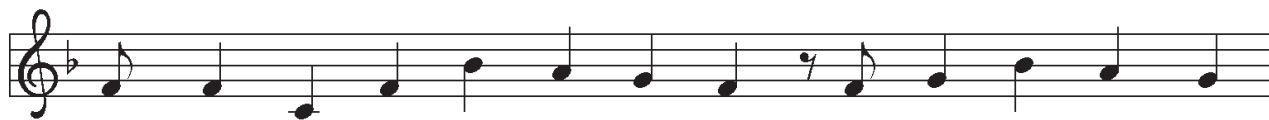

Paul D. Weber is Professor Emeritus of Church Music at Lenoir-Rhyne University, where he served as Director of Choral Activities for seventeen years. Weber composed today's setting on commission for the university's Lutheran centennial and in memory of his sister Grace Thea Weber '62. In 2001, Paul Weber wrote both text and tune in celebration of the 125th anniversary of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Hickory, North Carolina. The hymn is published in Weber's hymnary, *So Great a Cloud of Witnesses and Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

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We sing Martin Luther's hymn—the first hymn of *Etlich christlich Lieder* (Achtliederbuch, 1524)—in celebration of the 500-year tradition of Lutheran hymnody. Luther's text emphasizes God's grace, a central theme of his teaching and preaching. Luther's collaborator in the development of Lutheran music, Johann Walter, published several collections of hymns in three- and four-part harmony during the 1520s; the choir sings verse one today in a modern harmonization, to illustrate the role of choral harmony in Lutheran hymnody.

Johann Pachelbel—a progressive German composer of church, chamber, organ and other keyboard music—significantly contributed to the development of organ chorales. “Nun danket alle Gott” is one of Pachelbel’s ten motets for double choir; the third part—for a single choir—assigns the chorale tune in long note values to the soprano, and resembles a common procedure in his organ chorales. While serving in Eisenach and Erfurt, Pachelbel became acquainted with Ambrosius Bach—father of Johann Sebastian—and was godfather to daughter Johanna and taught music to Johann Christian.

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Susan Palo Cherwien is among the most prolific and influential of modern hymn writers. Her texts appear in hymnals spanning several denominations in the United States, Canada, and Europe. She published several collections of hymns and hymn festival reflections. Her texts give voice to Lutheran theology in our time.

John Ferguson's (b.1941) instrumental ritornello from his choral anthem "Comfort, Comfort" alternates with the stanzas in this festival. Ferguson served on the music faculty of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota from 1983 to 2012 where he nurtured generations of church musicians; his compositions include hymn-based and liturgical music for organ, choir, congregation, and chamber ensembles.

Igor Stravinsky was an influential modernist, twentieth-century composer. His compositional evolution identifies his music in three periods: Russian, neoclassical, and serial. Inspired by a Naplese commedia dell’arte he saw while touring with the Ballets Russes, Stravinsky’s ballet Pulcinella premiered in Paris in 1920.

Kenneth W. Louis served as Minister of Music and Worship at Holy Comforter–St. Cyprian Catholic Church for several decades. His study and passion for Gospel music is demonstrated in this anthem. He shared his expertise in Gospel music as clinician and consultant throughout the United States and abroad.

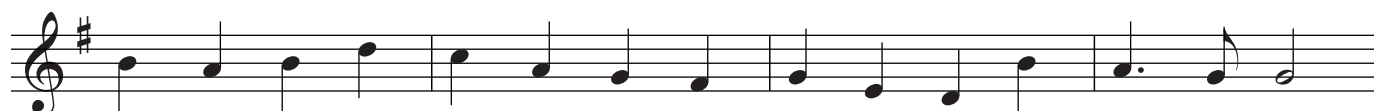

She has published four volumes of hymns as well as the textbook *Worship for the Whole People of God*. The hymn introduction in this festival was composed by Jihye Choi, University Organist and Director of Chapel Music.

The "Hallelujah" comes from Beethoven's passion oratorio *Christus am Ölberge* (1803) that depicts Jesus' emotions in the Garden of Gethsemane. Beethoven's trademark choral and symphonic gestures combine in this anthem praising Christ as triumphant redeemer.

Hymn writer Delores Dufner is a sister at St. Benedict's Monastery in St. Joseph, Minnesota. She has published five hymn collections and has received numerous awards for her work, including the Christus Rex award from Valparaiso University (2017). The tune Chesterfield by Thomas Haweis is found in *Carmina Christo* or *Hymns to the Savior* (Bath, 1792). The setting for today's festival by Chamber Concert Band member and chemistry major Noah Durlam was commissioned by the Valparaiso University Department of Music in celebration of the Lutheran centennial.

Claude T. Smith composed over 180 pieces for band, orchestra, choir, and small ensembles. An instrumental music educator in Nebraska and Missouri, Smith also authored methods books for band and orchestra. He also conducted church choirs and was an active guest conductor and clinician.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Julie Grindle '92 is a lifelong Lutheran church musician, accompanist, and teacher, now serving as Associate to the Bishop for Candidacy, Roster Care, and Administration in the Upstate NY Synod (ELCA). Prior positions include cantor to Lutheran congregations in Baldwinsville, NY, Bloomington, IN, and Virginia Beach, VA. She is a former president of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians and a former member of the advisory board to the Institute of Liturgical Studies (ILS). She has written for CrossAccent, InTempo, Sundays and Seasons, Living Lutheran, and the Prelude Planner blog. In 1996 she was privileged to play the refurbished Dobson/Schlicker organ at Valpo as it was rededicated, and then to be the Chapel organist and Director of the Kantorei for the 1997–98 school year. She now lives in Baldwinsville, NY, with her husband, David.



Conductor, music educator, soprano, and composer **Marin Jacobson** is delighted to serve the Valparaiso University community as the Phyllis and Richard Duesenberg Chair in Lutheran Music, Director of the Bach Institute, and Director of Choral and Vocal Activities. She previously served as Director of Choral Activities, Department Chair and Voice Area Coordinator at Malone University and as Music Department Chair, Director of Music Education, and Associate Director of Choral and Vocal Activities at Concordia University Irvine. Choirs under her direction have toured throughout the United States and abroad. Dr. Jacobson brings a wealth of experience in collegiate, church, community, school, and studio settings.



Beyond the university, she is a frequent clinician and adjudicator and has led choral festivals for students of all ages. Her professional activities include scholarship, performance, and composition. Her composition *Two Benedictions* was recently published by MorningStar Music and her article "Text and Musical Gesture in the Choral Music of Rebecca Clarke" was featured in the ACDA Choral Journal. In spring 2024, her article "Through the Church the Song Goes On" was published in Luther Seminary's *Word and World*. Dr. Jacobson served as guest conductor of the Summit Choral Society's Metropolitan Chorus (Ohio) in a performance of Mozart's *Vesperae solennes de confessore*, KV 339 in 2023. Jacobson previously conducted the Ames Chamber Artists (Iowa) and was founding director of the Mankato Children's Chorus (Minnesota). While living in California, Jacobson sang with the Pacific Chorale and premiered several of her compositions with the Concordia University choirs.

Jacobson earned the D.M.A. in Choral Conducting and Pedagogy from The University of Iowa, a M.M. in Vocal Performance from the University of Minnesota, and a B.A. in Vocal Music Education from St. Olaf College. She is an active member of the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), and the National Association for Music Education (NAfME).



A native of South Korea, **Jihye Choi** is the Director of Chapel Music, and University Organist at Valparaiso University, Indiana.

Prior to Valpo, professor Choi has served at Christ Church Cathedral in Indianapolis as organ scholar, and First Christian Church in Bloomington, IN as the organist, Assistant Music Director and handbell choir director. An active adjudicator and lecturer, she has judged in organ and piano competitions. Most recently, she was invited to Kwassui Women's University in Nagasaki, Japan as a guest lecturer and gave presentations on liturgy, organ performance practice and organ pedagogy for their church music program.

She has won top prizes in numerous competitions around the world including First Prize in Duo at the YoungSan Organ competition in South Korea, third prize at the Sydney Organ Competition in Australia. She has also appeared in the prestigious national competitions, such as Arthur Poister Organ Scholarship Competition (2nd prize), Fort Wayne National Organ Competition (1st prize), Sursa Organ Competition (2nd prize), and 2022 National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance (NYACOP, finalist). She is an active concert organist and performs throughout South Korea, Japan, Australia, Europe, and the U.S. Professor Choi holds degrees from Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, University of Cincinnati (CCM), and Seoul Theological University.



Diego Piedra is the Orchestra Director at Valparaiso University. A strongly driven performer and educator, Dr. Piedra feels at home working on the podium with student and professional orchestras. He served as Music Director and Conductor of Spectrum Orchestra, visiting conductor at Luther College and the University of Toledo, and guest conductor with the Dexter Community Orchestra and Oakland Symphony Orchestra in Michigan, and the Municipal Orchestra of Cartago and the National Symphony Orchestra of Costa Rica. Dr. Piedra was the orchestral conducting professor at the University of Costa Rica as well as a guest violin teacher and performer in Venezuela, Honduras and Guatemala. He founded the national youth orchestra Manuel María Gutiérrez at SINEM (the Costa Rican version of Venezuela's El Sistema), and was its Music Director and Conductor from 2009–2011. Since 2014, Dr. Piedra has been Music Director at the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra's Summer String Camp, working as a conductor, violinist, composer and arranger. As a professional violinist regularly plays with South Bend Symphony Orchestra and Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, and he has been a

member of the prestigious New World Symphony in Miami, Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, Oakland Symphony Orchestra, the National Symphony Orchestra of Costa Rica and Concertmaster of the Orquesta de Cámara de Costa Rica. Dr. Piedra participated as violinist and assistant conductor in the tour and recording of Bolcom's Songs of Innocence and Experience with the University Symphony Orchestra at the University of Michigan (winner of four Grammy awards in 2006), which culminated with performances at Carnegie Hall, New York. At Michigan, Dr. Piedra was the Music Director of The Campus Symphony Orchestra and the Campus Philharmonia Orchestra, and he conducted two full opera productions and numerous symphonic concerts. In the summer of 2017 he was awarded an honorary mention at a conducting competition in London, England, and more recently, an honorable mention from the American Prize, College/University Orchestra Division 2022. Dr. Piedra holds a D.M.A. in Orchestral Conducting and two Master's degrees from the University of Michigan. He studied violin with Guido Calvo, Dr. Bruce Berg and Yehonatan Berick, and conducting with Kenneth Kiesler and participated in master classes with Simon Rattle, Carl St. Clair, Giancarlo Guerrero and Miguel Harth-Bedoya.

Jeffrey Scott Doebler has been the recipient of the Valparaiso University Excellence in Teaching Award, as well as the Valparaiso University Alumni Association Distinguished Teaching Award. In 2018, he was named a Distinguished Hoosier by Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb. Dr. Doebler has served as director of music education and bands at Valparaiso University since 1992, following ten years of teaching in the public schools of Emmetsburg, Iowa, and Shakopee, Minnesota. He earned degrees in music education from Luther College (B.A.), Valparaiso University (M.M.), and the University of Minnesota (Ph.D.). His 43-year career in music education has achieved a unique balance of conducting, teacher preparation, leadership, and working with musicians from the beginning through professional levels, but all aspects of his vocation have had an ultimate focus on teaching. He has been recognized for teaching excellence by peers, colleagues, and students, including awards from the Indiana Music Education Association (IMEA), Valparaiso University, Luther College, Sigma Alpha Iota, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and the Confucius Institute. Dr. Doebler was a quarter-finalist for the Grammy Music Educator Award in 2014. In a typical year, Dr. Doebler works with over 3000 students. He has appeared professionally in 30 states, Canada, Malta, Italy, Australia, New Zealand, and China. Professor Doebler is a former president and state editor of the IMEA. He designed the IMEA All-State Future Music Educators Colloquium, a program that has been replicated in many other states. Dr. Doebler is a former president of the Indiana Bandmasters Association (IBA). For the IBA, he regularly conducts the All-Region and All-District Honor Bands, he conducted the All-State Band in 2011, and the Junior All-State Band in 2014. He is the first person to conduct at all four levels of IBA honor bands. Dr. Doebler is founder of a professional-level concert band, Windiana, which has toured China ten times, and has also toured Italy, Australia, New Zealand, and Hawaii. Windiana performed for the national convention of the Association of Concert Bands in 2011, the National Chinese Language Conference in 2009, and a headline concert at Carnegie Hall on December 29, 2022. Dr. Doebler serves as concert band conductor for Lutheran Summer Music, the national Lutheran high school music camp. He is conductor of the 156-year-old Michigan City Municipal Band. Professor Doebler conducts the handbell choirs at Valparaiso University and Trinity Lutheran Church. He is a former Indiana Chair for the Handbell Musicians of America. In 2018, Dr. Doebler conducted the Indiana All-State Handbell Choir. It is believed that this was the first all-state handbell choir in the nation.

The music of American composer **Zac Flasch** (b. 1999) is multifaceted, encompassing a wide range of musical and aesthetic approaches that aim to captivate listeners and evoke profound emotional responses. Drawing inspiration from liturgical, folk, and jazz music, his compositions meticulously blend elements of traditional and experimental music to create unique sonic experiences.

Rooted in a deep appreciation for narrative and the Christian faith, his music strives to delve into the depths of human experience and shed light on the universal aspects of the human condition. His portfolio includes choral, chamber, orchestral, and electroacoustic music. His music has been performed in the U.S. and internationally by university ensembles, church choirs, and contemporary artists and ensembles including Laurent Estoppey, The Galan Trio, Ensemble CONCEPT/21, the Toledo Symphony Orchestra, and Quince Ensemble. He holds a B.M. in Composition from Valparaiso University, and he is currently pursuing a Master's in Composition at Bowling Green State University.



Christian Guebert is a composer and music educator from Orange, California known for sonic experimentation in the handbell ensemble and for choral works of mixed instrumentation. His commissioned works include published and award-winning pieces, settings, orchestrations for instrumental and choral ensembles, and concert-length compositions.

Guebert holds a Ph.D. in music composition from the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music (2020), where he served as Teaching Fellow and where his dissertation "Timbral Use of the Handbell Ensemble" was published. He has taught university classes and lessons in theory, composition, ear training, singing, piano, counterpoint, orchestration, arranging, percussion, handbells, conducting, technology, and church music. As a frequent program director, he has headed several yearly concert series including community handbell ensemble concerts and sacred music festivals. He has served as adjudicator, clinician, and Composer-in-Residence for choral and instrumental organizations,

including three years as National Seminar faculty for Handbell Musicians of America (HMA) for a total of seven course topics. In 2020 he received the inaugural G.O.L.D. (Graduate of the Last Decade) Alumni Achievement Award from Concordia University Irvine.

Recent works include "Voyaging," a concert-length choral song cycle premiere of Walt Whitman sea poetry with harp and handbell ensemble. It premiered March 2019 as a culmination of his commissioning project as a Composition Fellow with Choral Arts Initiative in Orange County, CA. It incorporates "The Untold Want," the prizewinning piece of the nationwide 2017 Pacific Chorale Young Composers Competition, performed by the John Alexander Singers. Another recent large work is "Gaudete" for the Concordia Wind Orchestra at the 2021 Christmas concert series at Segerstrom Center for the Arts.

Guebert lives in Lake Forest, CA with his wife and two young daughters, and is the Director of Parish and School Music at Abiding Savior Lutheran Church in Lake Forest, CA and the Artistic Director of Velocity Handbell Ensemble in Oakland, CA.

Noah Durlam is a senior chemistry major at Valparaiso University. He serves as music coordinator for Candlelight and currently studies music composition with Dr. Jonah Elrod. He has previously written and arranged music for the Chapel of the Resurrection, including original music for a Lenten morning prayer service and a setting of Alleluia! Jesus Is Risen for Easter morning worship this past spring. He is incredibly grateful for the opportunity to contribute to the Lutheran Centennial Celebration and is excited to continue working with the VU Music Department and the Chapel.



The **Reverend Dr. Paul Weber** is Professor Emeritus of Church Music at Lenoir-Rhyne University, Hickory, North Carolina. For seventeen years he served as Director of the A Cappella Choir which toured annually across the nation and abroad to Germany, the Baltic States, Poland, Russia, Finland, and Costa Rica. He was the conductor of the Chapel Choir for twenty years, and Founder and Coordinator of the university's Sacred Music Program, developing it into a nationally recognized undergraduate course of study whose graduates now serve with distinction in churches and educational institutions.

Weber's compositions run the gamut from advanced a cappella works to large orchestrated pieces; from original hymns such as those contained in Lutheran Service Book and Evangelical Lutheran Worship to expanded hymn arrangements, such as A Mighty Fortress, sung by twenty-five thousand youth with concert band and choir at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis. Some of his accessible church anthems are found in the MorningStar Music Publishers choral series, Sacred Music from Lenoir-Rhyne.

Weber received the Raabe Prize for Excellence in Sacred Composition from the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians for a career of outstanding contributions to the profession as exemplified in a specific work. The winning anthem, Arise, Shine, published by Augsburg Fortress, was first sung by the Lenoir-Rhyne A Cappella Choir on its 2001 tour and has received subsequent performances by the Luther College Nordic and Cathedral Choirs, the St. Olaf Chapel Choir and Cantorei, and by the National Lutheran Choir at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels, Los Angeles.



Weber presently conducts the Chamber Choir for Bach Around the Clock of Staunton, Virginia, and continues to fill commissions. In retirement he also serves as supply clergy for Episcopal and Lutheran parishes. During the 2022-23 academic year he was Visiting Professor of Church Music in the School of Theology at Sewanee: The University of the South.

Weber received a doctor of musical arts degree in choral conducting from The University of Iowa, a master of musical arts degree in composition from Yale University, and a master of music degree in organ performance and composition from Washington University, St. Louis. He was in the first graduating class of Christ Seminary-Seminex and received a master of divinity degree through the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago which named him a Distinguished Alumnus in 2011. He attended Concordia College, Bronxville, New York, and Concordia Senior College, Ft. Wayne, Indiana, before registering at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. He was ordained in 1979. His ministry has included two pastorates in western Pennsylvania. Weber is married to Florence Jowers, former University Organist at Lenoir-Rhyne and Conductor of the Lenoir-Rhyne Youth Chorus. They are the parents of three adult children: Erin, Jeffrey, and Amanda.

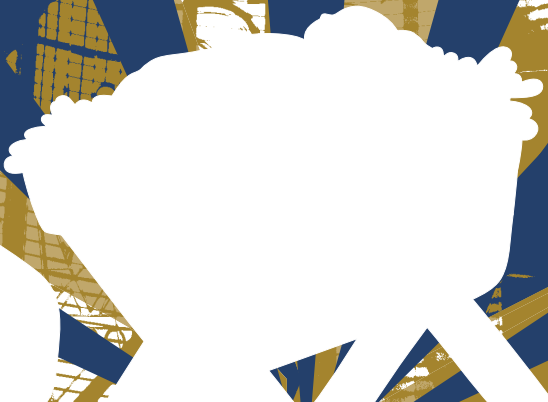

The Chapel of the Resurrection is built on the traditional homelands of several indigenous peoples, most notably the Potawatomi (Bodéwadmik) Nation. The land was ceded by Potawatomi leaders to the U.S. federal authorities on October 26, 1832, as part of the Treaty of Tippecanoe. We meet in this place indebted to this forced generosity.

Some of the indigenous population successfully resisted removal. Members of the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi (Pokégnek Bodéwadmik) established a sovereign government in Dowagiac, Michigan, and continue to live, work, and worship as our neighbors.
